One of those programs has been providing travel grants to young dermatologists who present at our meetings. It is an exciting opportunity for the participants, many of whom have not attended an international meeting. Scholarships will be made available for the XIth ICD as well.

For over 50 years ISD's mission has been to provide opportunities for all dermatologists to access the information and people they need, no matter their circumstances. We keep our membership dues low and deliver high quality as evidenced by the International Journal of Dermatology which all members receive.

We hope you will join us in India from December 4-8, 2013 and be part of an incredible learning experience with us.

From "Subar bon" Bus to "Baingan Bhartta" in a Taxi

"Subar bon" Bus: I used to visit Goalpara occasionally around 1990-91. There I had seen buses running from Goalpara to Pancharatna which were clearly labelled "Suber bon Bus" in English and Assamese. I was confused by the term. When I asked a stranger about the meaning of "Subar bon Bus" he explained confidently that the buses that ran between Goalpara and Pancharatna were known as "Subar bon" buses. When I dared to ask the reason behind such a name, the simple and proud answer he gave was that just as "city buses" ply in Guwahati, so "Subar bon Buses" shuttle between Goalpara and Pancharatna. After a few years finally I came to know that this "Subar bon Bus" were actually "Sub-urban bus", transformed "Subur-ban Bus" then to "Subar bon Bus."

Soket Jover repairing Centre: Around 1995-1999, I noticed some signboards at some roadside shops near Mirza whereupon was written "Soket Jover repairing centre". I was confused with the term. On close look I found that these were shops where old shock absorbers of scooters, bikes, cars and other vehicles were repaired by mechanics.
