Rhino horn - fact vs. fiction

All five of the world's diverse species of rhinoceros have been brought to the edge of extinction because of human craving for their distinctive horns. The great Indian one-horned rhinoceros is no exception to this. One often gets to see sad visuals of rhinos lying dead with their horns chopped off by merciless bipedal predators. Rhino horns have been a prized possession for tens of centuries in view of supposed medicinal and detoxifying properties as well as the sheer beauty of the artistic carvings made out of them.

Practitioners of traditional Asian medicine, who use rhino horn to cure medical ailments, consider it as an irreplaceable pharmaceutical necessity. That's what drives the demand on which the poachers thrive. Viewed from the aspect of modern medicine rhino horn doesn't have any medicinal benefit whatsoever, but it is a testimony to the power of tradition that millions of people believe that it does. 



Report of MID-CUTICON, N.E. States branch, 2014, Guwahati

MID-CUTICON, the annual regional conference of the Northeast states branch of the Indian Association of Dermatologists, Venereologists and Leprologists (NEIADVL), which is held after a gap of approximately six months from the preceding and succeeding CUTICON, was organized this year in Guwahati, the largest city and gateway to the North-eastern region of the country. The organizing committee comprised of Dr. Jogesh Das, Organizing President, Dr. Nasiur Rahman, Organizing Secretary and Dr. Anita Baruah, Scientific Chairperson.

Held in the evening of the 15th day of June, 2014 at Hotel Kiranshree Portico at the bustling Paltanbazar area at the heart of the city, the conference was inaugurated by retired professor and HOD of Dermatology, Dr. KK Das by the lighting of the ceremonial lamp at a short inaugural function. This was preceded by felicitation of dignitaries on the dais, Saraswati Bandana, ode to the goddess of learning, by Dr. Bornali Dutta, Assistant Professor of Dermatology, Fakhruddin Ali Ahmed Medical College, Barpeta, and welcome address by Organizing President, Dr. Jogesh Das, retired Professor and HOD of Dermatology and ex-Medical Superintendent, Gauhati Medical College Hospital, Guwahati. The inauguration was followed by a short address by Dr. KC Talukdar, President, NEIADVL. The next item was the inauguration of the NEIADVL newsletter by Dr. KN Barua, retired professor of Dermatology and ex-Principal-cum-Chief Superintendent, Gauhati Medical College Hospital, Guwahati. The vote of thanks was given by Dr. Nasiur Rahman, Organizing Secretary who was also the editor of the NEIADVL newsletter.

After the inaugural function and high tea, the members were shown to the adjacent conference hall while the accompanying persons were asked to remain at the same hall to enjoy the cultural

function which continued almost until midnight. The items included vocal renditions by artistes of Barnali Sangeet Vidyalaya and by cute little Shivangi, daughter of Dr. Bornali Dutta, a magic show to entertain the children, a dance medley by the Mejankari troupe and late night rocking performance by the Prana band. Cocktail and dinner was lavishly served with running snacks and drinks, and most of the attendees stayed back till the end of the function.

The scientific session was arranged in two sessions. Dr. Anita Baruah, Scientific Chairperson, welcomed the delegates to the scientific session. Dr. Baruah is a dermatologist at Nemcare Hospital, Guwahati. The first session was chaired by Dr. KN Barua and senior dermatologist, Dr. (Mrs.) J. Debi. It saw two speakers, namely Dr. (Mrs.) J. Nath, Professor and ex-HOD of Dermatology, Gauhati Medical College Hospital, Guwahati, who spoke on the subject of Transient Neonatal Dermatoses and skin care of the new born, and Dr. Bornali Dutta who spoke on recent advances in Dermatology. Both the topics invited a lot of questions and entailed a great deal of discussion. The second session was chaired by Dr. Jagjit Sethi, renowned practising dermatologist of Shillong, and Dr. (Mrs.) B. Barua, another dermatologist of repute from Skin Centre, an institute of Dermatology and Cosmetology in Guwahati. The speakers for this session were Dr. R. Gogoi from Skin Centre who simplified the surgical techniques for acne scar revision in a way that is palatable even to the novice, and Dr. B. Nath, famous dermatologist from Tezpur, Assam, who spoke on the interesting topic of the art of managing difficult patients in a doctor's clinic. The second session was also replete with intensive discussions and participation of almost all delegates present.

The official sponsors of the event were Ranbaxy Croslands, Biocon Immunotherapy, Omni Life Sciences, Torrent pharmaceuticals, Micro Labs and Canixa. The Organizing Committee is indebted to the sponsors without whose participation the event would not have been possible.

Rather he retaliated boasting that he could go anywhere in the world for the treatment of his relative. Rhino horn – fact vs. Fiction

Continued from page 1 According to traditional Chinese texts, such as Li Shih-chen's 1597 medical text "Pen Ts' ao Kang Mu", rhino horn has been used in Chinese medicine for more than 2000 years to treat fever, rheumatism, gout, and other disorders. It also states that the horn could also cure snakebites, hallucinations, typhoid, headaches, carbuncles, vomiting, food poisoning, and "devil possession." Rhino horn, is shaved or ground into a powder and dissolved in boiling water and consumed by the patient. Traditional medicine systems of many other Asian countries, such as Malaysia, South Korea and even parts of India also include rhino horn as a remedy for various illnesses. There is a belief in the West that rhino horn is an aphrodisiac but this is not mentioned in the Eastern literature. However, the problem is that people in the East are also starting to believe the same and now consuming it for this new indication. There has been a recent surge in demand for rhino horn in Vietnam as a cure for hangover and treatment of terminal illnesses.

In Greek mythology, rhino horn was said to possess the ability to purify water. The ancient Persians of the 5th century BC thought that vessels carved from the horn could be used to detect poisoned liquids, causing bubbles in the presence of some poisons — a belief that persisted into the 18th and 19th centuries among the royal courts of Europe.

In Yemen, the horn was used for the handles of the much-valued curved daggers called "jambiya," which are presented to boys at the age of 12 as a sign of manhood and devotion to the Muslim religion, as also for personal defence. Of course imports of rhino horn was banned in 1982.

Unlike the horns of most animals, which have a bony core covered by a relatively thin layer of keratin, rhino horns are keratin all the way through. Rhino horns are not, as once believed, made simply from a clump of compressed or modified hair. Recent studies by researchers at Ohio University using computerized tomography (CT) scans, have shown that the horns are, in fact, similar in structure to horses' hooves, turtle beaks, and cockatoo bills, containing large quantities of sulphur-containing amino acids, particularly cysteine, but also tyrosine, histidine, lysine, and arginine. The studies also revealed that the centers of the horns have dense mineral deposits of calcium and melanin, the former strengthening the horn, the latter protecting the core from being degraded by ultraviolet radiation of the sun. As the softer outer portion is worn away over time by sun exposure and by wear and tear, the inner core would be sharpened into a point (much like a wooden pencil).

There isn't much scientific evidence to support the plethora of claims about the healing properties of the horns. In 1990, researchers at Chinese University in Hong Kong found that large doses of rhino horn extract could slightly lower fever in rats, but the concentration of extract given in traditional Chinese medicine is many times lower than used in those experiments. There may be some truth behind the rhino horn's ability to detect poisons which is linked to the composition of the horn. Many poisons are strongly alkaline (or basic), and may have reacted chemically with the acidic keratin of the horn.

What keeps the trade running? In the first place is the strong belief in its assumed powers, which is deep-rooted in people's psyche. People tend to trust the ancient over the modern, and search for miracles when rational thinking fails to give desired results. Second, possession of rhino horn or articles carved out of it is considered status symbol in certain East Asian and Middle eastern countries. This further propels the demand. Third, and possibly the most important, is overwhelming poverty so rampant in the world. For people whose annual income is often far below the subsistence level, the opportunity to change one's life by killing an animal that they don't value is overwhelming. The first and second encourage the third, while the latter fuel the former. This results in a vicious cycle which need to be interrupted before the system goes out of control. Changing the mindset of people and eradication of poverty are as important as tackling the menace of poaching and the entire networks associated with this dastardly activity.
